#### **Meetings & Planning Applications**

Monthly meetings of the Panel have continued to be held since the last edition of *Bridge*. At those meetings a total of 14 applications were discussed.

Comments were sent to Wokingham Borough Council (WBC) on the following applications:

- Holme Park Sports Ground (medical consultation and physiotherapy clinic)
- 101/101A Pound Lane
- Land south of Old Bath Road (57 dwellings)
- Holme Park, Sonning Lane (floodlights)
- The Acre, Thames Street

#### Local Plan Update

It is likely to be the end of the year or early 2023 before the draft plan is made available by WBC.

### Village Gateway in Sonning Lane

The Society has been in discussion with Sonning Parish Council (SPC) regarding the replacement of the gateway at the bottom end of Sonning Lane. SPC has in turn discussed with WBC and plans are being developed by WBC for a replacement.



### Traffic

The Community Speed Watch scheme is proceeding to be developed. Five locations have been approved by Thames Valley Police and appropriate equipment has been obtained.

### Neighbourhood Plan

The draft plan is progressing well and Sonning residents will have the opportunity to examine it and talk to members of the working group at the Sonning Show in September.

#### **Spring Lectures**

Our Spring lectures this year were given by Simon Wenham and Tony Weston. Simon explained how the Victorians and Edwardians spent their leisure time, the higher classes boating on the Thames and racing, also going on grand tours and Cook's tours. The working classes would enjoy boxing and dog fighting and visit to the local seaside as the railway became popular. The comparison, quite extreme, but equally enjoyable.

Tony Weston talked about the River Thames and how to get across, under and over. 2000 years of navigating from early boats and ferries to the building of bridges for foot, cart and horse and rail. How the river expanded trade from Oxford to London.

### Visit to Fairmile Vineyard

On a beautiful June day a group of 14 enjoyed a visit to Fairmile Vineyard, Henley. Jan, the owner, explained how they developed the vineyard - planning, planting and many years later cropping. He described the different vines grown

and the processes from fermentation to bottling.



We had a tour of the vineyard, admiring the views and tasted a delicious rosé and a white sparkling wine with an option to purchase. Some of the party finished with a picnic.

### **Wildlife Activities**

Ali Driver Walked on the Wildside at Thames Valley Park and ran a pond dipping session at Ali's Pond

Ali's "Walk on the Wildside" took 20 local residents to the wetlands at Thames Valley Park (TVP). He started the walk by showing a range of moths caught the night before, including the remarkable dead twig mimic buff-tip moth. The group stopped on the way to TVP to sample aquatic life in the gravelly margins of the River Thames, but apart from a couple of freshwater mussels, the amount of invertebrates discovered was significantly less than on previous walks over the last 30 years - a worrying sign of the long term effects of diffuse agricultural pollution. Things improved markedly in the wetlands at TVP, which are rain and groundwater-fed, and a huge variety of freshwater life was evident in the sampling tray, including damselfly larvae, mayflies, caddisflies, water beetles and large quantities of microscopic plankton. Ali pointed out the shrill call of a kingfisher just in time for it to be spotted as it dashed overhead. Other bird calls were identified for the group, including Cetti's warbler, reed warbler, and blackcap. Ali trapped several species of damselfly and also a beautiful freshly emerged four-spotted chaser dragonfly which the group were able to see close up. The walk was liberally accompanied by various anecdotes and experiences from his 20 years as the first conservationist for the Thames in the 80s and 90s.

A few days later Ali was back in action, armed with his pond net and butterfly net once again - this time leading a pond-dipping session for primary school-aged children at Ali's Pond local nature reserve. The kids absolutely loved it. Each armed with a pond net, sampling tray and identification crib sheet, courtesy of Sonning Primary School, the enthusiastic children quickly immersed themselves in their subject, catching large numbers of greater pond snails, ramshorn snails, water boatmen, dragonfly and damselfly larvae and numerous baby smooth newts and great crested newts. The chatter and excitement reached fever pitch towards the end of the 90 minute session when one youngster even managed to catch a large adult great crested newt. All the specimens were returned unharmed to the pond, although some of the plant life in the pond margins may take longer to recover!

All in all, these were a thoroughly enjoyable pair of events for both Ali and the participants alike and they proved yet again to be a wonderful way to engage people in celebrating the wealth of wildlife on our doorstep if we just know where and how to look.

The Sonning Show started in the 1960s following produce competitions held by the WI in Pearson Hall. It still maintains the same format today with a produce competition to which residents of Sonning, Charvil and Sonning Eye, as well as members of village organisations are invited to enter.

There are a variety of classes covering cookery, fruit and vegetables, flowers, flower arranging, photography, art and craft for which cups and trophies are awarded to the winners. There are cash prizes for children's classes including cookery, photography, art and craft. From 2pm a fête takes place on the school field with many village organisations running stalls for their own fund-raising. In the arena different activities take place such as maypole dancing demonstrated by the children of Sonning School, a rugby display by Reading Rugby Club and Peg's Challenge which involves throwing water balloons to your partner!

This year the event will be on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> September and we have a packed show ground. Full details will be available at the end of July.
